Lylah came into my room, leaned down and kissed my head, Then sat next to my hospital bed. I took her hand and held it tight And wished I had the strength to fight.


We sat together, quiet and sad, A daughter and her dying dad. I saw the tears she tried to hide. She looked at me, and then she cried.

Basically we remember the lessons we have learned from past wars. Moving forward we take what we have gained and put it to use for the best yield. HOMELESS FURNITURE

Jessica (Pinky) Martinelli started drawing at a very early age, wanting to make visible the pictures and feelings in her head and heart. In 2008 she travelled to Zambia, Africa, with her community church, which peaked her interest in different cultures. At age 15 Jess came to Start Me Up Niagara. She does not come as an outsider: she has lived what many Start Me Up participants have lived.

Since she came to the Art Me Up program she has been a natural leader and teacher, bringing new people to the program and helping them to feel comfortable. Jess is a soul of the street: there is no phoniness about her, she tells it like it is.

Currently Jess is working with found objects and furniture which she refurbishes and refinishes with imagination and love. She has given her contribution to this show the name: Homeless Furniture. Cast-offs looking for a home.

"Everyone is on their own journey and is at a different place and time in their lives. One of the most important skills that I have learned is to be compassionate for others. Understanding the resources that our city has to offer helps us share and give encouragement to others to continue with their next step. Unlikely friendships make all the differences in each other's lives.

CHRISTMAS IS PAST, BUT...

Getting through the Christmas season can be challenging for many people. However, this year I wanted to know how the Christmas season might feel for our friends who are not Christian. So I asked our SMUN brother, Waqar Baig, if he would consider acting as reporter for Street News: to ask his brothers and sisters at the Mosque about their opinions and feelings. The interviews he returned with were incredible. Unfortunately, we do not have room to print the entire article in this issue, and so it will be broken into different segments over the next few issues. Here is Part 1 of Waqar Baig's "Mosque interviews about Christmas", transcribed from his original audio recordings as follows:

W.B: I am talking to Brother Mohsin, and I am asking him: "I want to know your feelings about Christmas in the Christian country... how do you feel about it when everywhere around are celebrating, are lighting lights, and shopping, and there are vacations... how do you feel about it being a Muslim?"

Brother Mohsin: "Well, the way I feel... it's kind of normal for me because first of all we are in a Christian country so we have to abide the laws and the regularities of the Christian country, so if they are celebrating Christmas, by all means, they can do so, and there's nothing wrong with that. There's a saying in Islam that says "if your neighbour is happy, so should you be happy," and if he is celebrating Christmas by all means shake his hand and wish him well! These are my opinions."

W.B: "Assalamo-Alaikum Brother Fasil. My question is: while living in a Christian country, how do you feel about the Christmas and the domination of the Christmas activities during Christmas times?"

Brother Fasil: "Being a Muslim I actually respect all religions and so I respect Christianity also. But also, being a Muslim, my kids ask me why we did not celebrate and I tell them that because we are Muslim we have other celebrations, and this is for the Christians. We celebrate Eid and we celebrate Ramadan and Eid Al-Adha and Eid Milad-Unabi, which is the Prophet Muhammad's Birthday." ("Eid Al-Fitr and Eid Al-Adha. Eid Al-Fitr is celebrated at the end of Ramadan (a month of fasting during daylight hours), and Muslims may invoke zakat (charity) on the occasion which begins after the new moon sighting for the beginning of Shawal". from Google)

"At this time of the Christmas season, I have been asked to record my feelings, and those of my fellow Muslims, regarding the activities around Christmas. It is mandatory for Muslims to believe that Jesus, Muhammad, Ibrahim and Moses are Prophets, and to believe that all Prophets are equal. So celebrating the birth of Jesus is respected by all Muslims. This is one of our core beliefs as Muslims, as it is so stated in the Quran."

W.B:

I am talking to Brother Ezedin, and I ask him: "how do feel about Christmas and the prevalence of Christmas in this country at this time of year?"

Brother Ezedin: "First of all I appreciate the question. As a Muslim I have no problem at the Christmas time and our friends from the Christian belief and those who celebrate Christmas, they are enjoying the time, they are exchanging gifts and being with their family. As a Muslim I feel happy for them because this is an important event for them and as a Muslim I have no problem with it... actually I enjoy the holiday during that time because I don't go to work! Ha ha, and I get benefit too. Of course as a Muslim I don't celebrate Christmas but I have no issue that our friends the Christian people celebrate that season and they enjoy it with their family, and it is a festive time... and no, actually I'm glad that they are celebrating and bringing the religious values of Christmas... not just the shopping part of it, but being with family and being generous at that time, and exchanging visits, and that's good! Thank you!"

Niagara and the Greater Niagara Chamber of Commerce celebrated International Women's Day at their annual Awards Day banquet. This year the International Women's Day award winner was presented to our director Susan Venditti.

"The award is given to Susan Venditti for her work with the Out of the Cold program and her contributions as leader. The award is richly deserved not just for Ms Venditti's incredible and tireless leadership but also for helping the homeless, unemployed, and those suffering for mental illness and addictions stay safe, warm, fed and sheltered on cold winter nights."

Susan's acceptance speech about her journey and the work of OotC was well received by the 800 in attendance. The keynote speaker Charmaine Crooks a 5 time Olympian, Olympic silver medallist, Member of the Order of Canada, speaker, entrepreneur and advocate for athletes and sports gave the key note address. Her address was inspirational reminding all women to be the CEO of their own lives.

Excerpts from Susan's acceptance speech

* .. one Sunday program and he asked for volunteers...I signed up to help. ...[I then attended a] meeting at the Queen Street Baptist Church...[where] Rev. Cathy Petrie explained that Queen Street Baptist had just completed a sixweek pilot project running an Out of the Cold program based on a program founded by Sister Susan Moran and her students at St. Michael's high school in Toronto. She explained: "Out of the Cold is about dignity and hope. It welcomes the poor and homeless. It provides a hot meal and overnight bed. It is a simple response to alleviate pain and

suffering. It saves lives during the coldest months of the year. It is a response to gospel teaching about welcoming the stranger." Seven nights of suppers and overnights became a reality that continues to this day.

Of course a committee would be needed so the Interchurch Out of the Cold Committee was formed. Rev. Cathy moved to Ottawa and asked me to take the lead on this committee. 22 years later I am still chair of this committee, co-chair of the Cathedral, volunteer and spokesperson. I attend meetings and advocate for change."

- * A conservative estimate is that 75,000 nights of accommodation have been provided during this time mainly by volunteers in church basements and auditoriums.
- * As one guest described Out of the Cold is a modern day miracle.
- * I have learned that being persistent works. That is takes a team to make things happen, that being kind is more important than always being right, that life moves in directions never imagined and that I have been blessed by the many people I have met along the way.

Out of the Cold wraps up its 22^{nd} full season with community dinners ending March 31 and overnights April 15. Thank you to everyone who played a role making this happen. November 1, 2019 will see changes as we continue to serve individuals without housing in our community and seek solutions to homelessness.






